


Club de Exploradores Newsletter

Explorers getting a lesson on how to handle their horses and the Pisgah stables on Avery Creek rd.

We began our day at Sycamore Flats, a popular picnic area located along the Davidson River just a little ways from the entrance of Pisgah National Forest on hwy 276. Here the Explorers practiced Leave No Trace principle #1 Plan Ahead and Prepare. After making and packing snacks and lunch, the Explorers got familiar with their new maps from Pisgah Map Co., checked the weather, filled up water bottles, grabbed their hammocks, got their day packs ready and headed to the Horse Stables on Avery Creek Rd for a morning of horseback riding.

At the Stables, we met Jerry and his family. Jerry has been running his horseback riding business for over 30 years and he told us all about his horses and was very gracious answering and asking us questions.

We rode for an hour, came back to the stables, gave our horses some treats, loaded the van, and headed to the Ranger Station to have lunch. After lunch we went to a semi-secluded spot where Avery creek meets the Davidson River. We hiked in, set up our hammocks, learned how to identify poison ivy and how to use jewelweed to relieve a poison ivy rash, and got in our hammocks for reflection and journal time.

The LNT principle of the day was "Dispose of Waste Properly", so after hammock time, we learned all about catholes, played Cat Hole Relay, and cleaned up other people's trash on the site, supporting a local initiative called "Packout Pisgah" in the process and leaving the spot better for others.

At the end of the day, the Explorers packed up their gear, collected all the trash, hiked out, got in the van with big smiles on their faces, and went home looking forward to our next adventure in the Pisgah National Forest.

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Jerry assigned us a new name for the day (our horse's name) and shared some fun stories with us. It was special to be out in the woods on horseback getting to hear all the forest sounds around us and taking up space in an activity that only gets a few Hispanic folks each season- according to Jerry who told us he wishes he could speak more Spanish and even wanted to practice some of the words he knew. It was a great time.

Tips to Identify Poison Ivy

- 1. Compound leaves with three leaflets.
- 2. The stalk of the middle leaflet is much longer than the stalks of the two side leaflets.
- 3. The edges can be smooth or coarsely toothed.
- 4. Surface can be glossy or dull.

"Leaves of three, let them be"



Native Americans used jewelweed sap to treat various skin rashes. If you crush the hollow stem and rub the sticky, clear sap on your skin, it quickly takes away the itch from poison ivy blisters or the burning sensation caused by stinging nettles. Generally, these plants grow close to each other as shown on the picture.
