In the last year alone, FIND has reinvested almost \$4,000,000 into the public lands we steward, helping to preserve public outdoor spaces for generations to come. These investments are part of our long-term commitment to serving the communities FIND calls home, while protecting the natural and cultural heritage of our sites.

Collaboration has always been a key driver of our success. From new partnerships with local schools and nonprofits to regional conservation alliances, last year we expanded our reach and amplified our impact. This is why we are excited to be opening the new NEST at FIND Outdoors community space, where aligned organizations can interface with like-minded groups and individuals. These efforts will bring about greater community engagement and further engage FIND Outdoors into collaborative relationships that ensure our work reflects the needs and aspirations of the communities we serve.

Our education programming has also seen a major revitalization. From changes to our interpretive signage to a complete overhaul of our field trip programming, there are many things to highlight. widespread destruction to the southeastern U.S., with particularly severe impacts in Western North Carolina. Public lands, including national forests and recreation sites, were hit hard - trails were damaged, facilities were flooded and access to popular outdoor destinations was cut off. This disruption not only affected these fragile ecosystems but also the communities and economies that rely on these spaces for tourism, recreation and employment.

In the aftermath of the storm, FIND Outdoors launched a Hurricane Helene Relief Fund to provide necessary resources, specifically for the restoration of public lands throughout Pisgah National Forest. With community support and generous donations, FIND coordinated over 3,700 volunteer hours, valued at over \$124,000, for clean up and trail infrastructure repairs and held events like Pickin' for Pisgah, raising nearly \$10,000 for damaged recreation sites.

Additionally, FIND Outdoors organized a volunteer fair to connect community members with a variety of non-profit organizations that work with our public lands, supported displaced staff through an assistance fund and partnered with STIHL to offer chainsaw training.

Employee Assistance:

Volunteers rebuilt boardwalks and bridges at Carolina Hemlocks, Coon Tree, Pink Beds, and the Cradle of Forestry. Cleanup also began at Black Mountain Campground.

Volunteer Fair:

FIND Outdoors hosted a multi-group volunteer fair featuring 9 local organizations that work on public lands in WNC. Our goal was to inspire new volunteers and strengthen collaboration after Hurricane Helene.



EXPANDING EDUCATIONAL IMPACT AT THE CRADLE OF FORESTRY

The Cradle of Forestry has launched four new field trip programs, expanding our educational reach and deepening our commitment to outdoor learning.

Developed in alignment with national and North Carolina state education standards, these programs are tailored by grade-level and designed to bring environmental concepts to life through engaging, hands-on experiences.

Each offering focuses on key themes of conservation, stewardship and sustainability, providing students with meaningful opportunities to connect with nature and better understand their role in protecting it.



Students from Rosman Elementary School visited the Cradle of Forestry for their first field trip of the year. For many, it was their first time experiencing this historic site, where they learned about the roots of forest conservation and connected with the outdoors through hands-on exploration.

Originally from Blairsville, GA, Dru comes from a family with deep roots in the area, dating back to the Georgia land lottery. Learning Center, the Historic
Gladie cabin is a reconstruction
of a cabin that was built and
lived by the Ledford family, one
of the first to settle in the Red
River Gorge. Cabins built at this
time were built by hand utilizing
chestnut, hewn by hand with a
broad axe. Spaces between the
logs would be chinked together
using a mixture of mud and
grass. Finally, white oak would
be split into shingles for the roof.

Some of the most notable folks coming out of the Red River Gorge are The Coon Creek Girls, one of the first all-female string bands. Formed in the mid-1930s, the band featured renowned banjo and fiddle player Lily May Ledford, her sister Rosie, Esther Koehler, Evelyn Lange, and later Minnie Ledford.

The group made regular appearances on the radio program Renfro Valley Barn Dance, and even played for President Franklin D. Roosevelt and George IV and Queen Elizabeth of England before they disbanded in 1957.

Lily May Ledford would go on to play folk festivals throughout the U.S. and Canada in the 1960's & 1970's. She was awarded the National Heritage Fellowship, the U.S. government's highest honor in folk and traditional arts. The Coon Creek Girls were inducted into the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame in 2004. Their intense, foot-stomping approach to traditional Kentucky Mountain Music continues to inspire and entertain.



Investing in Georgia

Unlike traditional concessionaires, FIND Outdoors is a nonprofit organization. We reinvest 100% of profits from campsite reservation fees, day use fees, ticketed events and retail sales back into the sites we manage. These funds support essential site maintenance, improvements and educational programming. In Georgia, FIND

Fall Gladie Reopening

Water system investment: \$153,467

The Gladie Cultural and Environmental Center is the hub for information in the Red River Gorge. When water systems went down in the Fall of 2023, the indoor facility operations ceased. With the support of the Cumberland Ranger District of the Daniel Boone National Forest, the Center was able to continue to provide information on trails and the history of the area to guests during the peak summer season despite the facility's closure.

FIND Outdoors, in partnership with the US Forest Service, invested in water system repairs that would allow the center to reopen in November 2024.
